




Framing Expectations Positively

 Construct messages that focus on the positive point of view – what to do











Easy as 1-2-3

1. State in the affirmative

2. Use Action-oriented Language

3. State plainly

Visit only approved websites	Don't surf the internet






Examples and Non Examples

Why is Positive Framing Helpful?



 Reduce the stress and anxiety associated with uncertainty

Neutralize bias in messaging

 Promote students being successful in routines

Main Points

 Positive framing is an easy to implement practice that is associated with positive student outcomes including social connectedness and positive behavior
